To ensure accountability, we have established documented policies, procedures, and internal controls covering key financial areas such as receipts and payments, procurement and sourcing of quotations, delegation of authority, and approval limits.

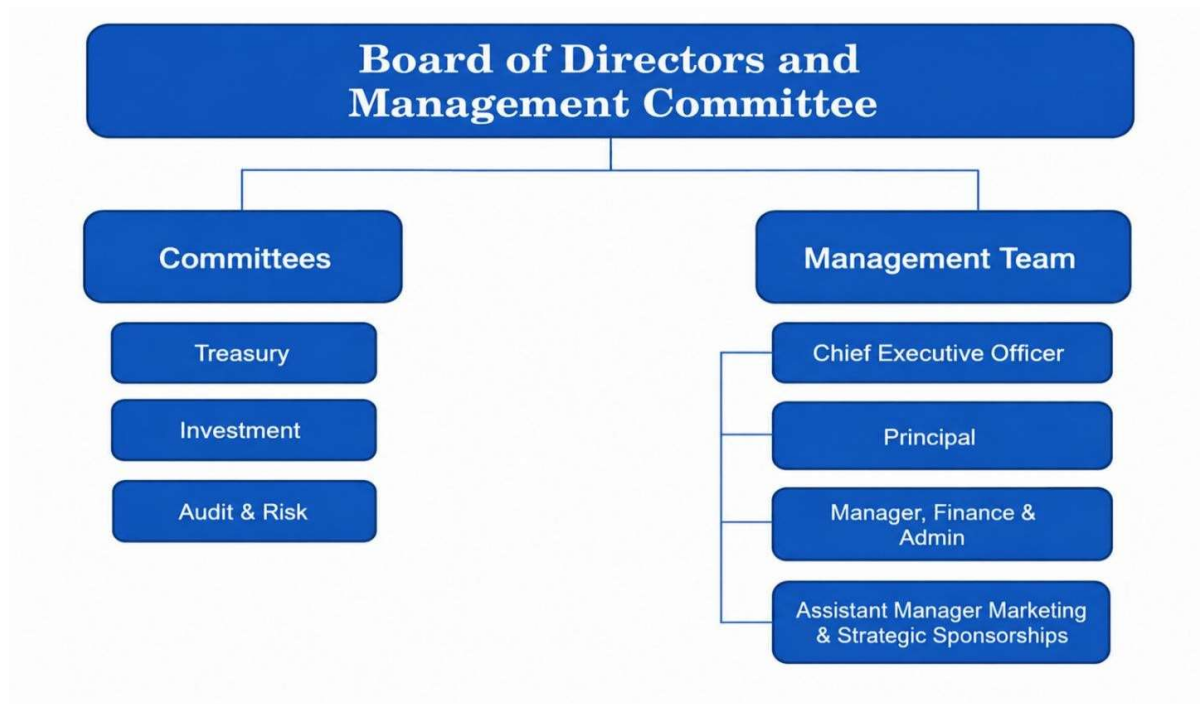

### Funding Sources

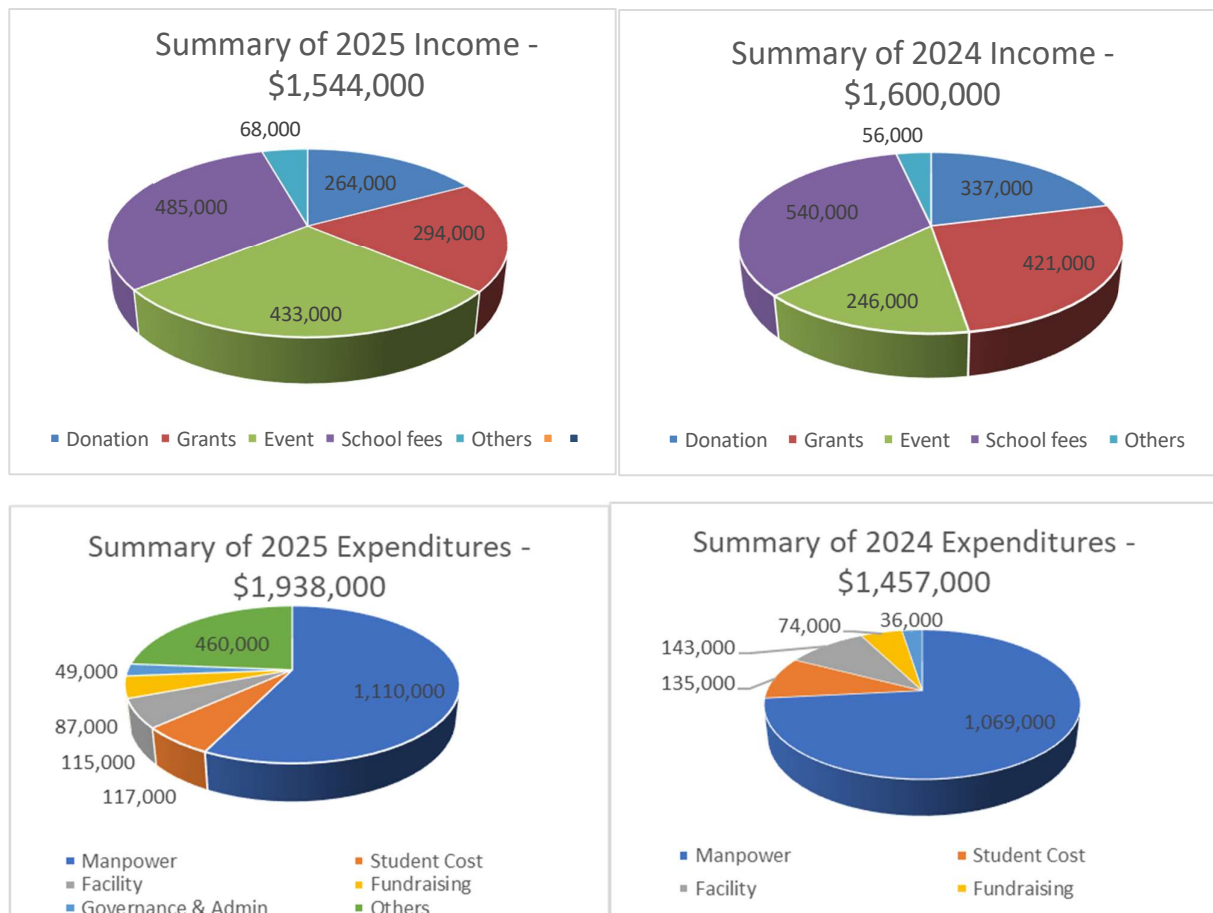
The Company is financially supported by government grants and donations from corporations, foundations and well-wishers.

### Reserve Policy

The reserve policy ensures long-term financial sustainability while fulfilling its charitable mission. This policy defines reserves as unrestricted funds available for operational needs, excluding restricted, designated fund. The Board of Directors commits to maintaining reserves equivalent to 50% of the annual operating expenditure, calculated via a ratio of reserves to yearly costs, reviewed every six months.

## REVIEW OF YEAR 2025

### Summary Financial Performance



- Income declined by \$56,000 mainly due lesser donations, lower grants and lower school fees due to drop in enrolment offset by higher event achieved.
- Expenditure increased by \$481,000 mainly due to higher staff cost from salary increment and loss arising from third-party fraud.

#### Major Financial Transactions

- Purchase of air conditioners \$15,917.

#### Governing Mission and Fundraising Strategy

In 2025, we have ramped up our outreach and fundraising efforts so as to continue providing quality services to as many deserving beneficiaries as possible. We had 2 campaigns in 2025.

#### Shining Bright, Growing Right - Target Donation - \$100,000 from 26 Dec 2024 to 31 Mar 2025

The Carnival and Celebration activities were conducted as part of the organisation's overall programme to promote greater awareness of inter-racial and social harmony. Funds were raised through games and carnival activities during the campaign period. The funds raised were used to introduce additional programmes for the children and teachers from Singapore's diverse socio-cultural communities. The campaign was made possible through the support of both on-site interactions with children and staff, as well as online donations, which provided opportunities for community engagement, exposure, and learning. This fundraising initiative was important for the children of Child at Street 11, as many came from underserved families and had limited access to such opportunities in their daily lives.

Shining Stars Lighting Children's Path - Target Donation - \$250,000 from 23 Apr 2025 to 31 Aug 2025

A Charity Golf Event was organised on 25 July 2025 with the strong support of the Celebrities Sports Club (Singapore). The event was held at Sentosa Golf Club's Tanjong Course and was followed by a gala dinner at the club. The event successfully raised funds to support Child at Street 11's ongoing efforts to serve children and families in the community. The primary fundraising methods included donations for golf flights and proceeds from the charity auction. In line with the organisation's mission of ensuring that no child is left behind, the funds raised were intended to support programmes that provide children with opportunities for growth and development, thereby contributing to a stronger and more inclusive society. With the support of celebrity participants and guests, funds were raised through an engaging golf tournament and gala dinner held at Sentosa Golf Club. The programme featured a performance by the children of Child at Street 11 and a charity auction of various items, including artistic works created by the children as part of the fundraising initiative. The proceeds from the event were used to support the organisation's efforts to enrich the lives of children through relevant curricula, activities, programmes, and community engagements designed to enhance their overall development and well-being.

## **Governance**

Terms of Office of the Board shall be as follows:

- Board Directors shall henceforth be elected for an initial term of 2 years, and may be re-elected for successive terms of 2 years, up to a maximum of 10 years.
- Any retiring Director may, at the discretion of the Chairperson, be invited to serve as an Advisor to the Board without voting rights for all matters put to the Board for approval, for renewable terms of 2 years.
- The Board shall elect one of its members as Treasurer for a maximum term of 4 years, which is not extendable or renewable by re-election.
- Any Director may resign at any time by written notice to the Chairperson and his/her resignation will be effective from the date of the written notice.
- There shall be a minimum of 5 and a maximum of 11 Director. The quorum required for all meetings and resolution is 50% of the existing number of Directors. For any matter put to the Board for a vote, where in the event of a split vote, the Chairperson's vote shall be deemed the casting and deciding vote.

## MOE HQ- Hari Raya Celebrations - 3 April 2025



We were delighted to welcome volunteers from MOE HQ who joined us in celebrating Hari Raya with a series of thoughtfully planned activities.

The volunteers prepared a variety of traditional Malay snacks — cookies and kueh's — and invited the children to taste them, sparking lively conversations about the different flavors and textures. This sensory experience was followed by a slideshow about Hari Raya, which concluded with an interactive quiz to reinforce learning in a fun way.

One of the highlights of the day was a hands-on craft activity, where the children created their own DIY shrink keychains. With guidance and support from the volunteers, the children colored, cut, and assembled their personalized keychains with great enthusiasm.

## Hwa Chong Institute - Project Bloom 7 April 2025



We were delighted to host volunteers from Hwa Chong Institution, who conducted a series of engaging activities with our After-School Care students.

The volunteers supported the children's learning in English, Mathematics, and Science through interactive lessons and hands-on exploration. They read storybooks to spark interest in language and literacy.

The Science sessions were especially exciting, featuring experiments with shadows and magnets that encouraged inquiry and discovery. The children also participated in hands-on activities to explore mass and weight, making abstract concepts tangible and fun.

We are grateful to the Hwa Chong volunteers for their time and effort in creating such an enriching and enjoyable learning experience for our children.

## Acronis Cyber Security – 22 April 2025



We were thrilled to welcome Acronis volunteers for a cyber security workshop!

The children explored safe online practices through an engaging slideshow and fun decoding activities, learning how to be responsible digital users. A big thank you to the Acronis team for making digital safety both meaningful and fun!

## Art Ground – 30 April 2025



At the Art Ground, children were introduced to the traditional art of batik. Guided by skilled facilitators, they learned the fundamentals of batik-making, including drawing with melted wax and applying dyes to fabric.

Throughout the session, the children were fully engaged, showing curiosity, patience, and pride in their final creations. This hands-on activity not only fostered cultural literacy but also supported sensory exploration and fine motor skills development.

Children were also taken to the UOB learning play zone where children learn financial literacy and art through role-playing as store owners, selling food using various forms of currency. They learn the evolution of currency - from sea shells, gold and silver coins to paper notes and credit cards. Children also get the opportunity to design their own currency notes here. Beyond financial literacy this learning play zone encourages creativity and social interaction.

## National Gallery - 20 May 2025



At the National Gallery Singapore, children participated in the Art and Family tour, which introduces selected artworks in a lively, age-appropriate manner. The session began with an introduction to four family values: love, care, commitment, and respect.

The children then explored the sculpture *Mother* by Thai artist Sompot Upa-in, which depicts a mother hugging her child — a powerful representation of love. To encourage close observation and critical thinking, they were asked questions such as:

- What is the sculpture made of?
- What color is it?
- How is the mother showing love to her child?
- How can you show love to your mother?

These questions guided the children to examine details carefully, reflect on the emotions conveyed, and connect the artwork to their own experiences. The activity fostered visual literacy, emotional expression, and the ability to interpret art meaningfully. Through this process, the children also developed empathy and strengthened their communication skills at a young age.

### Bird Paradise - 23 May 2025



The children had a fun and exciting trip to Bird Paradise with volunteers from Energy Markets. They saw many kinds of birds, including colorful parrots, flamingos, and penguins! The volunteers shared interesting facts about the birds, and the children listened carefully, learning lots of new things.

After the tour, everyone enjoyed lunch together at the park, happily sharing which birds they liked the most. This trip gave the children a chance to learn about birds and enjoy nature in a hands-on way. We are grateful to Energy Markets for their support and for making this a memorable experience for our young learners.

## Temasek Secondary School - 27 May 2025



Our Nursery, Kindy, and ASC students had a fantastic visit to Temasek Secondary School!

They explored new activities with secondary students, from folding origami and playing Red Light, Green Light, to the high-energy "Float Fight" Balloon Volleyball. A day full of fun, laughter, and learning!

## Hoo Bee Arts (The Metropolis) - 17 June 2025



Children from Child at Street 11 had the exciting opportunity to participate in Ho Bee Land's Arts for Kids programme at The Metropolis — a vibrant initiative that brings art to life for young minds.

As part of Ho Bee Land's corporate social responsibility efforts, the programme invites students, especially from low-income families, into an "imagination land" where they explore public art installations and create their own pieces. It's more than a field trip; it's a chance for children to engage with creativity in an accessible and inspiring way.

For the children at Street 11, many of whom come from diverse backgrounds and learning abilities, this experience is transformative. It shows how a real estate company can go beyond buildings to build possibility fostering imagination, confidence, and joy through the arts.

### Raffles Institution - 18 June 2025



Child at Street 11 had a wonderful time with Raffles Institution volunteers during our After-School Care STEM session!

The children built protective egg covers, made DIY stress balls, and explored hands-on experiments that sparked creativity, problem-solving, and teamwork. A fun and inspiring day of learning!

## Anderson Secondary School - 23 June 2025



This engagement holds special meaning for us, as it was initiated by our very own alumna, Cassidy Chen. Cassidy was part of Child at Street 11 from toddlerhood until the age of 12, and this year, she reached out to reconnect and collaborate with us once again.

Together with her peers from Anderson Secondary School, Cassidy organized three days of meaningful activities for our children. One session focused on the importance of plants, where children planted their own seeds, decorated their planting cups with markers, and brought them home to observe the growth process — a wonderful way to encourage responsibility and care for nature.

Another hands-on activity involved creating animal face masks using paper plates. With guidance from the volunteers, the children chose their favorite animals and worked together to design and craft their masks, sparking creativity and imaginative play. It was a fulfilling and heartwarming engagement — made all the more special by seeing one of our own return to give back.

## Soap Making Workshop - 26 June 2025 (Sponsored by Caregiver Support Hub)



Our Kindy children had a bubbly and exciting time at the Soap Making Workshop, where creativity met chemistry in a fun and safe environment!

To start, the children were given white, French fry-shaped soap base bars (sodium hydroxide-free and completely safe for handling). With the help of their teachers, they placed their containers in warm water and watched in amazement as the solid soap base slowly melted into a liquid. Once melted, the real fun began! The children picked their favorite food colouring and mixed it into the soap, creating beautiful swirls of color. They then carefully poured the colorful soap mixture into fun-shaped moulds. After some cooling time, the children proudly removed their very own handmade soap from the moulds — ready to take home and use! Learning Highlights:

- Hands-on experience with melting and pouring (fine motor skills)
- Exploring color mixing and creativity
- Understanding simple transformation from solid to liquid and back



## Baking Workshop - 7 July 2025 (Sponsored by BCD Travel)



It was an exciting and fun-filled Monday morning because we went to Genius R Us at SAFRA Toa Payoh for a baking class. It was my first time baking, so I was really nervous!
